

Reagan Hall Outstanding Undergraduate Student

According to English department faculty who have worked with Reagan, it is immediately apparent in each class that he is a sensitive and thoughtful reader whose engagement with his readings is genuine. Noting that Reagan's course readings are seriously annotated, one faculty member elaborated, "In a world where every time we open online documents a feeble-minded AI is offering to 'summarize,' Reagan's engagement with texts stood out." Likewise, Reagan's research project in a course on American women's writing in the 1800s zeroed in on "a key issue: what he called 'The Strategic Anonymity of Women Writers.' He discussed the anonymity of famous writers such as Louisa May Alcott, who had a secret career publishing gothic stories as A.M. Barnard before she published Little Women." Finally, in a senior seminar on literary theory and criticism, Reagan produced some of the strongest written work the professor had seen in multiple years of teaching the course, while his contributions to class discussions, both in-person and through online discussion boards, were consistently and impressively insightful.

According to English department faculty who have worked with her, Tecara Moyer is a deft reader and a wonderfully creative writer. She is entering a master's of education program at UCCS in the spring and, as a future teacher, supports her classmates with thoughtful questions about and encouragement of their writing. One professor commented that Tecara "excelled as a student in Advanced Grammar" and that she "now uses that knowledge to serve the UCCS Multiliteracy Center as a consultant." Another elaborated on that latter role, noting that as part of Tecara's work as a writing tutor she was embedded in an English 1410 class for a semester; this professor continued: "She is incredible. Something I admire so much about her is her genuine interest in my students and their ideas ... She has a natural curiosity about her that is going to make her successful in any career path she chooses, but especially if she ever becomes a teacher." Likewise, a third professor expressed that Tecara's "interpretations of the subtleties of Harriet Jacobs' writing moved our class forward. Her research project was risky and ambitious in that she focused on an important writer who has been ignored by scholars: Mary Abigail Dodge, who published under the name Gail Hamilton. ... Tecara's work brings an understudied woman writer into the larger scholarly conversation." Finally, in a senior seminar on traditions of detective fiction, Tecara's work ethic and commitment to clear comprehension and strong quality in her writing was striking, while her contributions to class discussion demonstrated a range of keen insights and a laudably open, inquisitive approach to her coursework.


HISTORY




Luis Lewis






